Facility Renewal & Systems Upgrades





- Repaired the building envelope
- Replaced outdated boiler system
- Installed 144 new windows
- Completed first third of roof replacement
- Upgraded WiFi system
- Provided high-definition resident cable TV
- Renovated our lobby
- Purchased new resident beds, lifts and shower chairs

A 2020 photographic report prepared by historic renovation architect Steve Wessling, who donated his time, focused on EFIS (stucco) repairs of main residential building and waterproofing.

Issues identified included:

During 2021, we remediated and painted the façade of the building at a total cost of \$800,000, including addressing leaks identified during work and repairing balustrades in garden.

In addition, we installed 144 new windows, and replaced the boiler system and hot water heaters.

The Boston Home leverages its long-standing focus on assistive technology to help residents stay active, engaged and connected.

- TBH provides residents with iPads and Amazon Alexa devices.
- Wheelchair Enhancement Center customizes device mounts.
- Rehabilitation therapists assist residents in learning voice recognition and other assistive technologies.
- Activities team coordinates virtual concerts and performances as well as family visits and holiday celebrations.



CASA-MS Comprehensive Assessment of Severely Affected Multiple Sclerosis

The CASA-MS logo is a pairing of two paintings by artists with advanced MS: Rhonda, a current resident of The Boston Home, and Mary Jo, a past resident. Rhonda and Mary Jo shared friendship, the challenges of living with MS, and the joy of painting in The Boston Home's popular watercolor program. In the logo, Mary Jo's sun rises over Rhonda's casa. The Boston Home Institute is a conduit to exchange ideas, programs, and care methodology with a wide range of partners involved in the management of this underserved population, especially in terms of long-term management of complex medical, physical, and psychosocial factors associated with MS and related disorders. There are three major pillars which comprise the inaugural mission of the Institute: Clinical Coordination and Collaboration, Clinical and Applied Research, and Education.

CASA-MS Study

A Comprehensive Assessment of Severely Affected Multiple Sclerosis, CASA-MS is a research partnership between The Boston Home Institute and the Buffalo Neuroimaging Analysis Center (BNAC, University of Buffalo). BNAC researchers completed their first on site data collection visit in August, 2021 with TBH residents as part of Phase 1 of the CASA-MS study. Members of the BNAC team met individually with residents to complete standardized neurological function exams and neuropsychological testing. Currently more than 35 residents and B-Fit! day program participants have enrolled in the CASA-MS study, and Dr. Jakimovski and Mr. Weinstock plan to visit TBH again this fall to meet with additional residents to learn more about how some people diagnosed with MS acquire a more progressive form of the disease.

University of Michigan-Flint Inspiratory Muscle Training Study
The Boston Home Institute recently partnered with researchers from the
University of Michigan-Flint to study the impact of respiratory exercise
using Threshold Inspiratory Muscle Trainer (IMT) for people with advanced
multiple sclerosis. The study showed a significant improvement in
respiratory muscle strength, with benefits sustained eight weeks after the
training program was completed.

B.Fit!

Day Program & Community
Outreach



B.Fit! is an innovative day program located at The Boston Home that serves individuals with multiple sclerosis and other progressive neurological disorders. It is a wellness and socialization program that offers participants a safe leisure experience that promotes empowerment and independence.

At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, B.Fit! quickly pivoted to a virtual model, providing daily check-ins for participants and a full weekly schedule of remote education programs, online field trips to Boston cultural destinations, virtual exercise classes, and social activities, in addition to delivering care packages to participants and helping them troubleshoot the challenges of the pandemic.

While virtual programming continues for those unable to attend in person, B.Fit! resumed on site programming in June 2021. Throughout the summer, B.Fit! members have enjoyed their return to community outings, with field trips to the Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University, the Institute of Contemporary Art, and Community Boating for a day of accessible sailing on the Charles River.



The Boston Home Rehabilitation and Seating programs have played a critical role in helping residents and outpatients combat the effects of decreased physical activity during the COVID-19 pandemic. Through the Compassionate Care Capital Campaign, we have been able to expand our suite of rehabilitation and diagnostic equipment.











Philanthropic support for The Boston Home allows us to offer residents the rich and engaging quality of life they deserve, as well as the support they need to pursue their interests and talents. Throughout the pandemic, our life enhancing programs have helped residents to thrive even during the challenging months of quarantine. In 2020, The Boston Home launched a new online art gallery through which resident artists can exhibit and sell paintings created in our popular watercolor program.

In our weekly writing group, residents explore memories, emotions, and noteworthy events in their lives. One resident poet was recently published in an online literary journal. Music is also an essential part of life at The Boston Home, with frequent live musical performances hosted in our garden or Activities Center. Our vibrant events calendar includes much-loved therapy animal visits, ice cream truck parties, trivia and games, as well as holiday and seasonal celebrations.
